Why are we here, what is our purpose? Rabban Yohanan ben Zakkai used to say: "If you have learned much Torah, do not claim credit for yourself, because for such a purpose were you created" (Pirkei Avot 2:8). We were created to learn. A year of pandemic is not one we would have chosen, but we learned a lot.

We learned that people in our community who are sick, disabled, or lack transportation can attend virtual services when coming in person is impossible. We learned a shiva over Zoom allows family and friends from all over the world to participate in the mitzvah of *nihum aveilim* - comforting mourners. We learned to "host" scholars and teachers and authors from all over the world to enrich our learning and expand our spiritual horizons. We took Judaism out of the synagogue, first into our homes, and then into public spaces like parks and parking lots for celebrations like shofar blowing and lighting Hanukkah candles. We learned the importance of calling one another regularly and bringing gifts of challah, babka, and hamentaschen just to say "You are not forgotten." And we learned how lucky we are and how our fortune obligates us to help those in need. We will carry these lessons into the future so that when we (soon!) meet again at 1004 Watts Street, we will return as a more accessible, welcoming, and connected community than ever before.

Perhaps most of all, we learned (or remembered) how Beth El is not a building or an organization; our success is not measured in facts and figures, but in moments of connection and community and love. It was not a year of our choosing, but it was a year of learning, and it was for this purpose that we are here.

GENEROSITY OF TIME AND RESOURCES

Our budget reflects Beth El's beliefs, values, and priorities.

Dues are the foundational commitment sustaining our community. Annual Fund gifts and Life & Legacy endowments strengthen that foundation, helping us live fully into our mission of plurality, diversity, and enriching spiritual experience – welcoming all members regardless of their financial means. Contributions of volunteer time and annual gifts, great or small, ensure that we can all enjoy meaningful and unique programming whether we are gathering virtually or in-person.

1/3 of our annual budget, including staff and educational resources, depends on revenue beyond dues.

Tuition and fees cover less than 1/3 of the budget for Jewish Education for children and youth.

25% of our members receive dues abatement.
