Message from Rabbi Greyber:



Israel Through a New Lens: My Experience with Interfaith Partners for Peace

I have been to Yad Vashem many times, but never with a group of African American pastors. We'd arrived to Israel just a few days before but had already formed a deep bond. The trip was not a fairytale; each of our black male colleagues were pulled aside by Israeli security at JFK for extra interrogation, an all-too-normal experience for men of color in America. I wanted Israel to be different for them. The histories and contexts are very different, but I could not ignore the commonality of

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my friends' experiences. Within 60 hours of landing, we'd heard heroic stories of Mossad officers who risked their lives to bring Ethiopian Jews to Israel in the 1980s (soon to be a Hollywood movie). We'd met two extraordinary Ethiopian Israeli women leaders, Belneyesh Zevedya, who'd returned to Ethiopia as Israel's ambassador, and Mehereta Baruch-Ron, who was finishing a term as Deputy Mayor of Tel Aviv. And we heard painful accounts of discrimination against Ethiopian Jews, Arab Israelis and Palestinians. Our friends had been baptized in the Jordan River and we'd stood together on the Mount of the Beatitudes; all amazing experiences. But Friday is the day I'll always remember.

I cannot describe the feeling of standing with my African American friends in faith and staring at pictures of Jews who'd been lynched by the Nazis, as they saw some of their communal history in mine, and I saw some of mine in theirs. As often happens to me when I visit Yad Vashem, the sheer enormity of the loss and the evil overwhelmed me, and, at the end of the museum's journey in the Hall of Names, I broke down and sobbed. My friends hugged me and we cried together. "Never again," they told me through tears. "This museum isn't just for me," I told them. "It's for all of us. Your community has suffered so much. We are with you, my friend. Together."

From there we went to Mahaneh Yehuda, Jerusalem's open air market. We walked past Marzipan bakery and my friend, Ronald, stopped the group, wafted the smell of rugalah to his nose and said, "That's amazing!!" We waded through the bazaar of smells and tastes and sounds "Ananas! Ananas! Ananas!" ("Pineapple! Pineapple! Pineapple!"), and finally settled down to a delicious schwarma-on-a-lafa lunch as the city started to close down for Shabbat.

We changed at the hotel and headed off to the Kotel (Western Wall). After some historical explanations by our guide, I suggested to Bishop Godbee that, rather than explain to him what would be happening in the men's section, I wanted him to experience it and to have his own religious experience at the Kotel. So we set words aside for a while and wandered through the throng of ultra-Orthodox men and tourists and yeshiva *bachurs* (young men) and soldiers, stopping for a minute to listen and even sing along with the wordless melodies, until we finally arrived at a spot next to the Wall. With no prompting from me, Ronald lifted his arms, leaned them against the wall, closed his eyes and started to "daven," by which I do not mean that he magically started speaking Hebrew, but rather he started to pray, moving his lips and speaking, but not so loud that anyone else could hear. I stood with him and davened as well, first Kabbalat Shabbat and then Ma'ariv until, after a while, we both finished and rejoined the group. I don't pretend to have insight into God's mind and heart, but I believe the Holy One must have smiled at that moment.

Finally, back at the hotel, we enjoyed a wonderful Shabbat dinner. Each of the rabbi-pastor pairs was responsible for offering a teaching to the group at various points in the trip, and that night was my and Ronald's turn. We were asked to teach about the opening verses of Toldot, when a hungry Esau sells his birthright to Isaac for some lentil stew. After an interesting discussion about the story, the conversation wandered back to our trip, when one of the pastors, a woman who was quite introverted, spoke up: "I have a confession to make. This has been an amazing experience that I feel lucky to have shared with you, especially my Jewish brothers and sisters. But I confess that a part of me has felt jealous, because Wakanda isn't real." It took a moment for the reference to sink in: Wakanda is the fictional African country in the Marvel movie, *Black Panther*. "You have a home now as Jews," she said, "but so often, especially in the past few years, we as black people feel like the United States doesn't want us." Her words took my breath away, pierced me. Tears streamed down my face.

One of our scholars-in-residence said to her gently, "I am a direct descendent of the Seer of Lublin (1745-1815), a great Hasidic rabbi, and today you can find a plaque at his home marking where he lived. But I'll never go back and feel at home in Lublin because his home is just a few miles from Majdanek, a death camp in Poland. But you, you are trying to make a home in a place of your persecution. It is an unimaginable challenge."


"It's just so hard to feel like you don't have a home," she said, as her peers around the table agreed, "Uh huh." "Ain't that the truth." "So hard."

That night, I sat and cried with my brothers and sisters of faith. I cried with a renewed sense of gratitude for the State of Israel that my black Christian friends had given to me, deep gratitude that the Jewish people have a flawed but beautiful home again after thousands of years of wandering and suffering. And I cried for the pain that African Americans have endured, and continue to endure, here in this country that enslaved them and where they struggle so mightily to feel at home. That night, I pledged to myself and my friends that they will not be alone, that I will do what I can to help them know that the Jewish community is with them in their pain and struggle. I prayed that God will enable Beth El and The River Church to grow closer in the years to come and will give us strength for both our communities to do the holy work of making home together.

A Note from Executive Director Alan Friedman

Synagogue Safety and Security Post-Pittsburgh



Jewish organizations throughout the U.S. have been ramping up security protocols for more than 15 years, but now, even more, we have to balance new safety factors with a desire to be welcoming. Beth El has always kept safety and security as one of our highest priorities, but in the days, weeks and months since the shooting in Pittsburgh, we have been busy revisiting, revising and creating new plans and protocols.

It is a challenge that synagogues across the United States are struggling with as they try to meet the need for increased security to protect their constituents while not becoming closed

off and inaccessible. We always want to be warm and welcoming, as well as safe and secure.

We know we cannot arm our way to safety -- it doesn't work -- but we can make sure we have the best possible safety and security measures in place.

The Jewish Community Relations Council of New York identifies five specific areas to focus on:

- 1. Control access to your facility
- 2. Plan your emergency response
- 3. Develop a routine
- 4. Don't forget to train
- 5. Explore your security hardware options

Beth El congregants Dan Schnitzer and Adam Singer have been working with me as part of a security task force initiative that was created days after Pittsburgh. Through our work together, we have focused on looking at and addressing those five areas as we update our safety plans. With these in mind, we have looked at the Freedman Center, Trinity Avenue Presbyterian Church (TAPC) and plans for our new building.

In January, we will offer a training workshop on emergency responses specifically related to evacuation and active shooter situations. We will cover information for both the Freedman Center and TAPC. Once we are back in our building, we will hold another training dedicated to the new space.

Security plans for the new building have been increased by adding 18 indoor/outdoor cameras, panic buttons, and more secured/electronic entry through the main and school entrances. We continue to work with local Durham authorities and the Department of Homeland Security as plans are developed to ensure we are doing the best job of keeping our community safe.

Recently I was asked to present an update on the Youth Education Department at a Beth El board meeting. There was so much to share I found it difficult to cram it all in to a 20-30 minute window, while also allowing time for questions. It was exciting to be able to talk about the incredible growth and success of our programs for those in preschool all the way through high school. So exciting, in fact, that I forgot to mention all of our Early Childhood programming until more than halfway through the presentation! Thank goodness there was a preschool parent in the group and their face reminded me to mention our overflowing early childhood programming and services.

From Simchat Tot Havdallah in Pajamas to our USY chapter electing their first board

and winning Seaboard Region's Chapter of the Year, as well as our Talmud Torah enrollment going up 20% since last year, there seems to never be a dull moment in the Youth Department at Beth El. We have a youth faculty of 26 talented individuals, ranging from high school students to veteran teachers and full time staff working with our youth.

As I write this article, I am in the midst of preparing to temporarily hand over my official Beth El responsibilities to our incredible youth faculty and full time professional staff. As you read this, I will, God-willing, be on maternity leave with our new baby. I'm so grateful to know that during these weeks, Rebecca Levine (current Junior Congregation leader, substitute Talmud Torah teacher and past Director of Teen Engagement) will be teaming up with our full time and part time staff to ensure that all of the programs we've built up over the years continue to run smoothly. I'm thankful for the time that Beth El allows its employees to care for their families, and I'm looking forward to attending Tot Shabbat with Emily and Simchat Tot with Hinda from the other side of the aisle as a participant!

Teen Engagement





On December 1, 2018, 36 teens came together for our third annual Teen Takeover Shabbat, a day in which teens lead every aspect of Saturday morning services. These teens ranged from seniors in high school to recent B'nei Mitzvah and even pre-B'nei Mitzvah participants, and led everything from Kiddush blessings to chanting haftarah.

Some highlights also included our BEDUSY Chapter President, Sydney Kirsch, taking on the role of the synagogue president by reading the bimah announcements, as well as a parsha-themed conversation between myself as Director of Teen Engagement and Rabbi Greyber in place of a sermon, echoing the practice of our B'nei Mitzvah. Our BEDUSY Religious/Education VP, Levi Price, also took a central role in recruiting teens to sign up for Teen Takeover Shabbat.

Why is Teen Takeover Shabbat such an exciting accomplishment? There are a number of reasons. It enables our teens to continue the journey they started on their B'nei Mitzvah of taking on leadership roles in services, and to keep those skills sharp. It enables our younger kids to visualize what being a Jewish teen looks like beyond their B'nei Mitzvah, and sets a community standard by which new B'nei Mitzvah don't just disappear. It also gives our community the chance to witness and celebrate with us the success of our youth program, making the teens feel like an important part of the congregation and valued for their contributions.

The impact does not end on that one day, however; in the three years since our first Teen Takeover Shabbat in 2016, we've seen a marked increase in teens leading services throughout the year, whether on ordinary weeks, the anniversaries of their B'nei Mitzvah, or the 17 (!) teens that took on honors during this past year's High Holidays. In September, we conducted a Teen Shlichei Tzibur survey where we collected feedback from our teens about which parts of services they are interested in, how often they would like to lead, and in which areas they would like to be tutored, so that we can be more effective in our outreach to teens for future participation.

Thanks to the efforts of so many people in our community, including Caryn Rossi, Levi Price, Elisabeth Gerson, Rabbi Greyber, and our Gabbaim, our teens will leave the nest well equipped to be leaders in their college Jewish communities and beyond!



Social Action Committee

The Social Action Committee has had a busy few months! Our <u>High Holiday Food Drive</u> raised over \$1,652, which was donated to National Jewish Federation for Hurricane Relief, Urban Ministries, Families Moving Forward, Walltown Food Bank, Iglesia Hispana Emanuel Food Band, and Durham-Chapel Hill Jewish Federation.

We also participated in the <u>Taste of Trinity Fall Festival</u> on October 7 by baking, working in the bake shop, and helping TAPC with clean up.

We were also very excited to participate in the <u>Habitat for Humanity Build</u> on October 28. We participated in the local Neighbors for Habitat build, constructing a house for a traditional Muslim family. In addition to donating money through the Mitzvah Fund, on our official build day, 6 Beth El members worked the morning session, 11 in the afternoon, and 15 attended the dedication of the home.

Social Action and the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund made matching donations to <u>HomeShare Durham</u>, a program that matches home providers with home seekers via a screening process of both, conducted by Joseph Barnes, the HomeShare Durham Program Manager. Renters pay below-market rates in exchange for providing agreed-upon services. The program is the first of its kind in North Carolina and currently has two sets of home sharers and seekers living together.

We are continuing our <u>ongoing drives</u>: food, toiletries, special requests from Urban Ministries (e.g. men's and women's underwear, socks...)

Community of Caring

A Conversation with Michaela Davidai

As a member of Beth El for almost 30 years, Michaela Davidai has seen her share of joyous events, difficult times, and times of illness. And over the years, she has often reached out to help others. For example, she has frequently offered rides to members who couldn't drive but who wanted to attend Shabbat services or who had appointments. Then, a couple of years ago, she became more active in the Community of Caring, as she was easily able to volunteer for specific tasks, such as making calls to housebound members, preparing meals, or providing transportation. While the co-chairs organize the community's needs, congregants choose when and how they are able to assist and can sign up for a single activity or on multiple occasions. Michaela appreciates the ability to choose which activities fit her schedule and budget.

Michaela brightens as she talks about the people she has met through these opportunities. She especially enjoyed getting to know someone recovering from surgery who needed assistance with household tasks. She shares that she didn't know this congregant beforehand and that she admires his strength and kindness. By helping this member and others, Michaela contributes to the community in a tangible way, and she smiles as she describes the warmth she feels after a face-to-face visit, a human touch. Yet she focuses on the other benefits: creating new connections, deepening existing friendships, catching up with people, and meeting our diverse membership.

She discusses how some congregants seem hesitant to ask for help. We talk about the benefits of community, of making connections, and of helping others. "I just like to help. It's that simple," she says. So when she hears someone mention a medical appointment or wanting to attend an adult education program, she offers a ride, even if they haven't explicitly asked. "I don't want to nudge them, but it's good to get them out of the house."

As we finish our conversation and I head out the door, Michaela calls after me: "We are practically neighbors. Let me know if you ever need a ride to shul!"

We have had a busy few months at the construction site. If you have driven by, you have seen lots of progress on the steel structure of the additions to the social hall and the office suite, as well as walls and a new roof. You can see our new pergola (the architect's name for the cover over the walkway from the parking lot). If you live in the neighborhood, you may have heard our trucks coming by early - we appreciate everyone's patience with the process.



Inside the building, most of the interior wall framing is also complete. Much of our new heating/cooling ductwork is also in

While we have had the usual challenges that face a project of this magnitude, we are still progressing to have the construction finished in late spring (technically, June 21 is the start of summer), and then we will start the process of moving back into the building throughout the summer. This will include a lot of volunteer opportunities to help with unpacking, cleaning, setting up new furniture, landscaping, etc, etc. We are working hard to build a space we all love, and appreciate the trust you have placed in us.
